Walk Safely to School Day

On Walk Safely to School Day, primary school aged children are encouraged to walk with their parents or caregiver to school. This encourages healthy habits as well as teaching vital road safety skills.

We will be hosting our Walk Safely to School Day on Friday 24th May.

This May marks the 25th anniversary of National Walk Safely to School Day. Championed by the Pedestrian Council Australia, the initiative aims to raise awareness of the health, road safety, transport and environmental benefits that regular walking, or alternative active transport (especially to and from school) can provide for the long term well-being of our children, not just on Walk Safely to School Day, but every day.

Apart from the physical benefits, regular walking (or similar) also has a favourable impact on children's cognitive and academic performance. Walk Safely to School Day also encourages positive environmental action, better use of public transport with reduced cardependency and encourages parents and carers to walk more, reducing dangerous traffic congestion around schools.

All students who walk to school will receive a sticker upon their arrival.

AEDC

Commencing on Thursday 30th May our Reception students will participate in the Australian Early Development Census. The AEDC is a national census that is conducted every three years by the Australian Government, in partnership with state and territory governments. It measures how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.

The AEDC is voluntary and it does not measure how well children are doing at school, nor how their school compares to other schools. Instead, it shows how children are growing and progressing in five key areas, what is being done well and what can be improved.

The AEDC is completed by teachers based on their knowledge of the children. Children do not need to do anything to be included in the census and will attend class as usual while the census is conducted.

Teachers will answer questions about the five key areas of early childhood development, which are: physical health and wellbeing, emotional maturity, social competence, language and cognitive skills (school-based), and communication skills and general knowledge.
