Dear Parents, Caregivers and Families,

Last Friday our students had "the best day ever" thanks to the great performers in Jam Band. Not only did our children listen to some great live music, but they also had the opportunity to dress up in some very cool costumes and be part of the performance. Students had been practicing the songs for weeks in preparation, and it was great to see them join in so enthusiastically. This year was the beginning of a new tradition of having them visit our school each year.

On Monday staff were engaged in professional learning focusing on Behaviour Management presented by Bill Hansberry, a former teacher and very respected expert in behaviour and restorative justice. Staff learnt a lot throughout the day, with some things reaffirming their already good practice. Over the later half of the year we may be "tweaking or trialing" some things in classrooms to see what impact it has on student behaviour.

Tomorrow morning I will be hosting a tour of the school for families of new Reception students looking to enroll their children at our school for 2025. The STEM Aboriginal Learner Congress is an annual departmental initiative to engage and inspire the next generation of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. It offers interactive and challenging STEM experiences designed to demonstrate that Aboriginal students are powerful STEM learners and lead thinkers. We look forward to hearing about their adventures when they return to school.

Last but not least, a reminder that next Friday is our Book Week Parade. The theme for this year is "Reading Is Magic". Parents and families are more than welcome to attend the parade.

### Thursday 22nd August - Electives


12-1:15pm

## **Tree Planting**
